RESEARCH IMPACT

Databases	I have built or co-built much of the open comparative data infrastructure the field now runs on. The Austronesian Basic Vocabulary Database (2008) was among the first open linguistic databases of its kind and has supplied data for c. 340 subsequent studies by other researchers. With POLLEX-Online, TransNewGuinea.org, Pulotu, D-PLACE, CLICS, Lexibank and Grambank, these resources cover a large fraction of the world's documented languages and cultures, receive on the order of 150,000 visits per year, and are linked from Wikipedia and the Open Language Archives Community. Standards	Co-author of Cross-Linguistic Data Formats (CLDF), now the common interchange standard for comparative linguistic data, and of the Concepticon and CLICS resources on which much of the field's downstream tooling depends.
Wider reuse	These data are used in genetics, anthropology and archaeology, and increasingly as training and evaluation material for machine learning on languages that have almost no other digital footprint.
Policy	Findings on the drivers of language endangerment have been incorporated into UNESCO's <i>Languages Matter: Global Guidance on Multilingual Education</i> , the UN Food and Agriculture Organisation's <i>Forests for a Better World</i> , and the OECD's <i>Not Lost in Translation: The Implications of Machine Translation Technologies for Language Professionals and for Broader Society</i> .
Communities	The databases document Pacific and other Indigenous languages directly, and speakers use the structured data for teaching, dictionary work and revitalisation; I am regularly contacted with requests for materials. Data governance follows Indigenous data-sovereignty (CARE) principles, and the resources support the deposit and retrieval of endangered-language materials held in archives.
